Welcome from our Kenyan Chair

Over the year we have introduced innovative programmes in partnership with government and other NGOs impacting on more vulnerable families in the communities we serve.

As a charity we have an excellent reputation in Kenya for working closely with the communities we support, improving lives of orphans and vulnerable children and their families as well as providing access to healthcare.

We support families with practical needs such as safe and secure homes. This year a number of families benefited from house construction and four schools from the provision of water tanks for safe and clean water. We also continue working to reduce jiggers through our schools outreach programme to reduce the negative effect of the disease on children's education and help improve their school attendance.

Our farming partnership with The World We Want and One Acre Fund enabled over 150 farmers obtain higher yields with improved quality, food security and improved diet. All this has only been possible through the overwhelming support from our God-given supporters.

We would like to thank our trustees, dedicated staff, partners and donors for their continued contribution and we look forward to strengthen these relationships as we develop our communities for the glory of God.

The Nasio Trust Story


The Nasio Trust is a unique charity which identifies and supports vulnerable children while keeping them with a family, underpinned by the strong belief that the institutionalised care of orphans can often have tragic results.

Children who grow up in orphanages are likely to experience significant social, physical, and cognitive harm. Studies show that the institutions, and the child's journey through them, are depressingly similar. The tragedy is that so many of these "orphans" actually have a living parent.

Poverty is the largest driver of institutionalised care.

The solution isn't building more orphanages; it's finding creative ways for each child to grow up in a home, preferably the home of the remaining immediate or extended family. Not only is this a much better alternative to institutional care, but family support services cost a fraction (estimates are as low as 10%) of an institutional placement. The Nasio model works by providing services for the children while they are still living with a family.

On top of this solid foundation, The Nasio Trust empowers communities to break the cycle of poverty by providing education, improving health and developing commerce.



Our Vision

To achieve healthy, self-reliant and sustainable communities in Musanda and Mumias and to lead the way in replicating the Nasio Trust model in Kenya and elsewhere in East Africa as a route out of poverty.

The Nasio Model



































The Nasio Model is closely aligned to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

Underpinning our approach is support of vulnerable children in their family setting, interventions that build self-reliance to lessen dependency, and peer learning that will lead to sustainability and stronger, independent communities.

Achievement and Impact:

greatest achievement is community transformation. Although we are a relatively small charity, we focus on making the biggest impact with our limited resources and budgets. Adopting a cross-cutting holistic approach we have established three foundation programmes which when combined, provide the holistic support we believe is vital to improve the lives of orphans and vulnerable children.

These comprise:

A vital 'social work and access to education service' that supports 337 vulnerable children through psycho-social care, food, security, advocacy and representation for child-headed house-holds.

There's also access to education and training with two ECDs (Early Childhood Development Centres). Health Care comes via a purpose built medical centre which provides lifesaving health and medical services to our children and the wider community.

Lastly we're nurturing entrepreneurship, having researched. developed and established an innovative Spirulina production unit.

The unit adheres to national and international standards, producing a ground-breaking nutritional supplement. Spirulina is proven to tackle malnutrition and boost the effectiveness of antiretroviral drugs when used as a high protein dietary supplement, and the unit has created a number of employment opportunities for our guardians.



Impact & Long-term Change

The impact of our approach is reflected through established community education and health structures and social services that did not exist before Nasio's interventions.

337 vulnerable children now attend school, receive welfare support and have food security which has built confidence, self-belief and secure childhoods where previously there was none. There is increased community health awareness so people stay healthy, avoid HIV and, through support given to small holding farmers, children have improved nutrition resulting in higher concentration levels and better educational outcomes as well as providing farmers with additional income from surplus produce.

Kenya at a glance

Kenya is a country in eastern Africa with coastline on the Indian Ocean, bordered by Tanzania, Uganda, South Sudan, Ethiopia and Somalia. Although Kenya's economy is the largest by GDP in east and central Africa, an alarming percentage of the population still lives in poverty, and life expectancy at birth remains low (67 years).

Kenya has the joint fourth-largest HIV epidemic in the world (alongside Mozambique and Uganda) in terms of the number of people living with HIV, which was 1.6 million people in 2018. Roughly 25,000 people died from AIDS-related illnesses in the same year, and there are now 660,000 children orphaned by AIDS. 41% of the population is under 15.

Case Study: Cedrick

Cedrick Onyango aged 12 was trained as a Nasio Trust Peer Educator. He took up the challenge to practise what he learned by sensitising fellow peers on matters of sexual and reproductive health.

He trains and facilitates sessions with other students; his target is to reach 1800 schoolmates in the same school. He also formed a health club with 80 members, which is overseen by two nominated teachers who provide advice and guidance.

Through the leadership skills gained from the Peer Education programme, Cedrick has been appointed the school president and at county government level he qualified for a national leadership competition in primary school. He has shown confidence and become a role model to his peers, able to influence positive behaviour and attitude.



Peer Education

Following the generous funding from Egmont Trust we implemented a successful Peer Education pilot in 2018.

The programme offered over 400 vulnerable adolescents the chance to increase their awareness and understanding of health issues, staying safe and avoiding HIV, reducing early sexual debut and teenage pregnancies as well as creating stronger communities through youth citizenship. Young people are sensitised on staying away from engaging in harmful practices, including

early marriage, gender-based violence, sexual exploitation and drug and substance abuse.

Over 65 Peer Educators were successfully trained; their intervention and impact will reach a further 20,000 youths living in Musanda and Mumias transforming their lives.

Case Study: Florence

Florence is a 21-year-old Peer Educator in Mumias and a student training in Early Childhood Development Education.

She has mobilised and sensitised her college students on matters affecting their sexual reproductive health and HIV. She has formed a college health club that comprises 82 members from different faculties who meet weekly. They are more knowledgeable and positive about behaviour change and knowing their HIV health status. Students are now able to talk freely about their sexual reproductive health at Christian youth meetings.

Adult Education Classes

With £1000 funding from Eleanor Rathbone Charitable Trust, presented to the charity in March 2018, we have been able to initiate a 12-month adult education programme in Musanda, Western Kenya. 27 women attended the classes held at St Irene's day care centre, held four times a week.

The classes are run by former head teacher Norah Neonda, who encourages a bit of healthy competition between these incredibly determined women, leading team challenges, involving word play. Norah's style of teaching is inspiring and she is an excellent role model to these women, whose ages range from 24 to 72. Norah tells the class: 'you must leave your shame outside the door, because when you come here, you must be brave'. Throughout 2018 we have seen significant

changes in the character of some our students, and the women who regularly attend the classes are growing in confidence each day. Norah's students are delighted to be able to interact with visitors from the UK who volunteer at our projects, and many intend to use their new skills to set up small business ventures

Case Study: Salome Atera

Salome is a 52-year-old mother of 14 children but sadly 9 have passed away. When she joined the adult class, she was unable to read or write, but through gritty determination and hard work, she has learnt to hold a pen and can now write her name and sign documents with clarity and understanding and can read simple English sentences.

Salome is a good learner and supporter of the adult literacy class. Through her active advocacy in the community she has encouraged more learners to join the class. Her greatest desire is to speak fluent English and to be able to write

clearly. Through her commitment and regular attendance at the class, she has become a jewel to admire in the village.

Her determination has boosted her selfesteem and she has become a group leader in The One Acre Fund, one of our community programmes. With her new found confidence she communicates with members of a diverse community with ease and light humour.

Being a Christian, Salome loves to read her bible and says she is looking forward to improve daily in her speech, reading and writing capabilities.





In February 2018 we carried out an assessment of the health services provided to determine the most frequently diagnosed diseases, access to HIV/AIDS services, immunisation and prenatal and antenatal care to identify any gaps and how far patients travelled to access treatment.

We found that patients came from 64 different localities. The most common ailment was upper respiratory tract Infection in 19% of patients caused by cooking on open fires in enclosed spaces, not realising the harmful effects of the smoke. This was followed by malaria at 14% caused through lack of awareness of preventative measures and being unable to afford mosquito nets. The prevalence of malaria among children under 5 years, who are most at risk, was worryingly high.

Thanks to MPM's generous funding we were able to install an electronic medical records and management information system in our medical facility to improve efficiency, patient diagnosis and security of health records. It has helped us to monitor and prevent the prevalence of diseases like malaria by focusing more on preventative measures.

Thanks to our generous supporters we were also able to purchase a Haematology Analyser to count and characterise blood cells for disease detection and monitoring, especially in HIV infection, monitoring antiviral treatment and identifying patients at risk for opportunistic infections.

Income Generating Projects

Guest House

Our Guest House accommodated 85 volunteers in 2018 with placements lasting between 3 days and several months. We welcomed visitors not only from the UK but also from Abu Dhabi and Sweden.

Our volunteer programmes are hands-on and we work hard to match the skills of the volunteers to the project needs, ensuring satisfaction all round. The 4 houses built this year were constructed by our volunteers together with local builders. These community projects have a big impact in the community as well as providing new skills all round.





Cafeteria

Our cafeteria set up next to the Medical Centre provides patients and the local community with nutritious meals, snacks and drinks. It also is a hub for our staff and the community to meet and talk as well as providing much needed income for our projects.

Spirulina

The seven guardians working in our Spirulina greenhouse produce 4kg of dried Spirulina a month, which is enough to make 8,000 capsules a month for use as a food supplement. This not only benefits our malnourished children (22 at St Irene and 18 at Noah's Ark) and those in need in the community, but also provides the guardians with an income to support themselves and their families. People in the community buy the product at an affordable price and the income from this is reinvested in the Nasio projects.



Farms

We acquired 9 acres of land for our food production, especially of maize which is the staple food. Our aim is to produce over 200 bags of maize each growing season using better farming methods introduced with the help of One Acre Fund. This means all children can be fed from our own produce and therefore save costs. More info at www.oneacrefund.org.





Dairy

Christine the cow is pregnant again (the calf is due in January) and currently producing 11 litres of milk per day (saving the charity £150 a month on the purchase of milk). The milk is given to the malnourished children at St Irene's and the funds saved can now be used to pay for other items like healthcare and food for the children

Child Sponsorship

Child sponsorship is one of the ways you can support a child in our care, provide them with an education, an opportunity to be a child and grow to reach their full potential.

We know poverty is a thief. It robs children of the right to grow up strong and healthy. It steals their time to play and denies them the chance to sit in a classroom and learn. From our child sponsorship programme donations we are able to fund our work at the Early Childhood Development Centres. We provide basic needs of food, medical care and education. In 2018,

25 new children became sponsored through the Nasio Trust raising our total to 337.




Japheth is our 1st Graduate!

Volunteering with Nasio

The Nasio Trust runs a volunteering programme, popular with young people. It gives students the opportunity to learn what life is really like in the developing world and, unlike many corporate organisations running gap year excursions, our programmes are hands-on. Volunteer placements can last between 10 days and several months, tailored to suit individual needs. We also provide elective placements for students studying medicine, nursing, midwifery, nutrition and occupational therapy. All our volunteer placements directly help the communities (we do not support 'Voluntourism') we match the skills of the volunteers to the project needs.

Rotary Club Support In Tanzania

The Abingdon Rotary Club and Rotary international provided funding for the installation of water tanks in Oldonyo-sambu Tanzania. This area has a population of around 10,000 and has been severely affected by fluorosis due to the contamination of their water supply.

A big thank you to the Abingdon Rotary Club and Rotary International for the funding. This will ensure that children have access to clean safe, drinking water so reducing exposure to the risks of fluorosis.

This is an excellent, more local project, for our Kili climbers to visit after their climb to see one way their donations make a difference.





Nasio & One Acre Fund Farming Project

With great thanks to funding from The World We Want we supported over 150 Nasio Trust subsistence farmers using the One Acre Fund model.

We provided high-quality seeds, fertilizer and expert agricultural training to improve maize quality, crop yields and profits. The programme was very successful with many farmers experiencing an increase in their yields of up to 50% compared to previous years.

Supporting families to have sufficient food will ensure health and nutritional needs are met improving children's attendance at school, achieving higher educational standards, improving income for families and helping them to find a sustainable route out of poverty.

In 2020 we aim to increase the programme to 500 farmers.

Global Leadership Training Conference



We know that the quality of outcomes we can expect is directly related to the level of investment we make into our staff.

In 2018 Nasio staff in Kenya were able to attend a Global Leadership Conference in Kakamega. This allowed them to improve their leadership skills and network with other like-minded individuals.

The group had a fantastic time and look forward to continuing their professional development in 2019 and beyond.

The Fight Against Jiggers

Jiggers are parasitic insects found in most tropical and sub-tropical climates. It is native to Central and South America, and has been inadvertently introduced by humans to sub-Saharan Africa.

Approximately 50% of children in areas where we work are affected by jiggers. Left untreated the consequences are severe, in extreme cases leading to amputation of limbs or death. Even mild infections are detrimental. Children perform less well at school and often drop out because of the debilitating effects and the pain, trapping the next generation in poverty.

In 2018 we treated over 700 people for jiggers, freeing them from the misery and discomfort of infestation. The sheer volume of people affected has quickly shown that if we're going to make a long-lasting difference in the fight against infestation, we need to prevent it from happening in the first place.

With this important work in mind, 2018 saw the launch of our "Shoes for Africa" appeal which seeks to kick-start a number of local shoe making workshops in Western Kenya. Not only will we be able to distribute shoes to those in need (to prevent them from ever experiencing the pain of jiggers) but excess stock can be sold, injecting much-needed income into the local communities we support.


Textiles Hub
